

COVID-19 Response

Church of the Good Shepherd's Church Council has taken on the role of "Health Team" as we consider when and how we can return to in-person worship. No date has been set at this time, as our congregation and building size limits our ability to safely open our doors. After discussing a document from our Bishop and the Northern Illinois Conference that lists "Absolute Guidelines" and "Best Practices" for Phase 3 and 4, the Health Team has decided to continue with online worship only. Examples of the restrictions that led to that decision include the limit of 50 people for a gathering in any 24

hour period, the social distancing that may limit our numbers well under 50 people, and the restrictions against singing (which is one of the more dangerous ways that a virus can be spread).

Thank you so much for your patience and understanding in the meantime, as we find creative ways to continue to be the church together!

The Church of the Good Shepherd has been meeting on a regular basis. Most recently, our Health Team agreed that worship services will return when our area reaches stage 5. Groups allowed inside our building at this time will be limited to: groups who contribute to our online worship production, recognized Good Shepherd groups, our Little Shepherd Preschool, and others with a previously agreed-upon contract. We are keeping watch on safety guidelines set by the Northern Illinois Conference and how they apply to our own building and ventilation system. Our goal is to be sure all who enjoy our church building can do so in a safe and healthy environment.

Cleaning supplies, PPE, and thermometers are available for church groups meeting in the church. They are located in the Gathering Room closet and down in the lower level foryer (where the PADS mats are usually kept)

"Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord ... you will find a baby ... lying in a manger." Luke 2: 9, 11, 12


They saw, they listened, and then they went to see for themselves. After receiving the Good News, they spread it.

I am proud to be the President of our UMW which consists of so many dedicated and committed women along with being part of a generous church.

This was an important year for the national UMW as the Board of Directors was elected. I found this interesting so am including an excerpt from an article in the November/December 2020 **response** page 36 by Tara Barnes, editor.

Every four years, United Methodist Women members elect a national United Methodist Women Board of Directors. Twenty women are elected at quadrennial jurisdiction events: Four from the North Central, Northeastern and South Central Jurisdictions, two from the Western Jurisdiction, and six from the Southeastern Jurisdiction based on the number of members in each region. Each jurisdiction also elects two alternates. Five additional directors are later nominated and elected by the national organization to help ensure diversity.

United Methodist Women jurisdiction events are usually large, in-person gatherings with worship, speakers, workshops, volunteering and actions in addition to elections. This year, because of COVID-19 safety concerns, the events were cancelled and elections, for the first time, took place online.

The representatives elected from our North Central Jurisdiction were from Indiana, Michigan, Dakotas, and West Ohio. The alternates come from Illinois Great Rivers and Iowa.


