"The Good News"

He was the first known person to travel to all 419 National Park Service sites in the U.S. in April 2019. Mikah Meyer loves nature and he can't seem to get enough of it. But he also wants to feel safe when he is exploring God's creation, and to help others feel safe as well. He is not concerned about the inherent natural dangers of mountain lions or wildfire or steep places. Mikah is concerned about other humans. He is concerned about the bigoted, hateful people who would speak disrespectfully or threaten violence toward people like himself, a gay man, a proud member of the LGBTQ+ community.

He was also aware that, as a white man, he has the responsibility to use his position in society to advocate for a racially fair and inclusive society. This was his inspiration in the wake of last year's murder of George Floyd and the protests it created.

So Mikah began a campaign called "Outside Safe Space", to "make the outdoors a little kinder and more welcoming for the next (racially inclusive) lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender person to pass through" (Bob Timmons, Star Tribune). The giant outdoor outfitter store REI hired Mikah to be part of its #OptOutside campaign. He wants to spread a symbol he created: the traditional gay pride rainbow re-calibrated into the form of a tree. He hopes the presence of such a symbol will tell people who have been discriminated against, such as himself, that in this place, they are accepted and welcome.

That's the hope of Church of the Good Shepherd, that as people see our traditional symbol of the Christian cross, and the rainbow we posted outside, they will know we are a safe place, a welcoming people, who embrace all of God's children, just as we ourselves have been embraced by our loving God.

Hebrew 10:23 Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful.

As we start to see more hope and light and the end of the Covid-19 pandemic, and we are once again able to gradually meet in person and reach out in person, what does that mean for Christians? We have the blessing of having the hope and light of Jesus Christ within us, but for many of us, that hope has been restricted to our homes and zoom.

Everyone around us has suffered some kind of loss, for some it has been the death of loved ones, others perhaps health. Jobs, in person school, proms, graduations, the ability to see one another at church on Sunday, family visits, all these things have changed. Some just didn't happen and some moved to our computer screens. So as a Christ loving people, what does moving forward look like?

Perhaps at the most basic level what our world needs now is a return to or a beginning of feeling safe and secure. For children who have spent much of the pandemic at their homes with a parent, this will mean learning to be ok going on their own to school again. Some will flourish in the opportunity and some will have anxiety. We must find ways to encourage them. One of my favorite sayings during the pandemic was "it's ok to not be ok". As Christ followers, we should be and make safe places for those children who don't feel like things are ok.

Many adults have lost their jobs due to closure of stores, restaurants and businesses, or even because of day care issues. Food insecurity has become a major issue in the US. The scripture is clear as Christ followers.

James 2:15-17 Suppose a brother or sister does not have any clothes or daily food and one of you tells them, "Go in peace! Stay warm and eat heartily." If you do not provide for their bodily needs, what good does it do? In the same way, faith by itself, if it does not prove itself with actions, is dead.

Let us work to show love and grace to all as our world heals and let us put our faith into action for those whom we can help.

Blessed to be a Blessing

Many times in Scripture we are promised that the one who gives will receive.

Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap" (Luke 6:38).

"Bring the whole tithe ... Test me in this,' says the Lord Almighty, 'and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it' "(Malachi 3:10).

What happens when we emphasize the latter instead of the former is the development of a "name-it-and-claim-it" type of religion in which we give only so we can get.

First Timothy 6:5-10 warns us of the dangers of this attitude. Paul wrote that false teachers *"think that godliness is a means to financial gain."* We know from Scripture that we have been blessed that we might be a blessing

to others. Therefore, we share our wealth—our monetary wealth (Romans 12:13), our wealth in talents and responsibilities (1 Peter 4:10-11), our wealth in experiences (2 Corinthians 1:4), and our wealth in time (James 1:27).

God blesses us so we can be his instruments to support the needy and extend his church.

"You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God" (2 Corinthians 9:11).
